Aintree at Nobles Update

There is currently an ongoing review of local capacity and ability to repatriate patients from Aintree back to Nobles for treatment.

Eylea 8mgs is now in stock alongside the usual dose given currently.

Eylea is the drug used to treat age-related macular degeneration and a larger dose will enable patients to have an extended time gap between injections.

Appropriate patients will be switched over to this dose which will lead to an increase in patient capacity at Nobles.

Manx Utilities Authority, electricity support and advice for customers

Manx Utilities Authority provide a free Home Energy Advisory service, customers should call us if they have any specific questions regarding their consumption or would just like to have a chat about steps that might help them reduce their usage. They can also arrange a visit to your home if that is more convenient.

They encourage customers to call as soon as they have any concerns or issues about paying their bill

or if they simply need more time to pay, they are happy to go through the options available.

MI Card

The MiCard service which is currently used to collect state pension or social security benefit at a post office will end on 31 December 2025.

From 1 February 2025 the MiCard service will not be available to <u>new</u> pensioners or social security benefit customers. Instead, their pensions/benefits will be paid directly into their bank or on line accounts.

Existing MiCard users will have until the end of next year to switch to direct payments.

How and when will I need to switch from using my MiCard at the post office to having my benefits or state pension paid into my bank or on line account?

You can do this at any time by emailing **socialsecurity@gov.im** or by calling **685686**. You don't have to do this now, but we would encourage you do so as soon as possible.

Little Gem Fall Alarm

Julie Mattin from GemaCare has donated a Little Gem Fall Alarm to Sight Matters. This will be used to give members the opportunity to try, if this is something they are thinking about signing up to. If anyone wants to trial the Sight Matters device or loan it for a short time, please speak to Stacy on 674727. This is not a product we can endorse but want our members to be aware of what is available.

A bit about the device from Juile:

The Little Gem Emergency Alarm is very simple to programme and operate: if you can send a text message you can programme the device. I spent many months testing the device in varying situations including sending my son off road up the hills to see if it worked. When I was happy that it worked on the Island the next challenge was to make it cost effective for all. I spoke to our telecoms providers and told them what I wanted, it was agreed that they could provide the sims at a very reasonable price, with their help I can keep the cost down, which means everyone who needs one can afford one.

How does it work?

The Little Gem works in two ways — in the centre of the device is an SOS button, it is raised so you can feel for it if you can't see it. You press and hold the button until you feel a vibration in your hand and an audible sound. All numbers preprogrammed will receive a text message sharing your location. The device will then start calling the numbers until one of them answers. You can then talk to them so they can send the appropriate help you need.

The device will work wherever you are, it is not limited to your home. You can take it shopping with you, you can take it when you go for a walk, you can even take it if you go the UK or Northern Ireland.

That is a lot of information to take in – here is the shortened version.

Programmed with numbers of your choice, these can be changed when needed.

Low cost

Press and hold to call for help

Full back up support – 24/7

No Hidden charges.

GPS location and open phone line to speak to the responder.

Take it anywhere you go.

Water proof – take it in the shower

Bright Green colour – a stranger or emergency worker can clearly see it and know contact can be made with your loved ones. - our emergency services know about the device.

Settings can be changed quickly by you or by phoning Gemacare.

Perhaps I should start by saying I had a check-up in St Pauls in late November for my Iluvien implant which proved it was still working well, my eyes are stable, and I am not due back until May 2025 for the next check-up. That's remarkable as far as it will be 24 months since the implant and have had no other treatment since then. That's great

financial news for our health service. If I had continued with the monthly eye injections the cost of travel and injections would have totalled £34,800 by May this year. As it is the total cost will be £8,500 a saving to the health service of £26,300. To say nothing of the time and cost of the medical staff that treat me.

Many of us suffer from "dry eye" and over the last ten years I've tried just about everything to alleviate it. Blepherpclean pads, Hot water and cotton wool pads, creams of various types all with varying levels of success. The other day I read about a new portable eye bath that generates warm mist. As you can see in the photo of the one, I've bought. Obtainable from various outlets but mine from Amazon UK for just over £15.00 It contains a rechargeable battery and is extremely easy to use. The profession claims warm moist steam can be the best therapy for dry eye. So, I will test it out and report back in the next Optic Topics but if anyone reading this has one then it would be good if you could let me know your thoughts to be included in the test results.

I have been made aware that many are unaware of the Sunflower symbol used world-wide in airports and many other places to signify "Hidden

disabilities" It was created in 2017 at Gatwick Airport and has since spread worldwide. Airport staff being trained to observe then assist if needed such wearers. Not everyone with a disability needs help all the time but it's great to have such help instantly when needed. The Hidden disability sunflower symbol is for Sensory loss including difficulty seeing, A physical disability that may not be obvious, autism, a learning disability, anxiety, or any other mental health condition. So, for example someone wearing any one of these items can go down the quick lane to the righthand side in JLA security instead of perhaps queuing for a long time in the normal zigzag lanes. For island residents the easiest way of obtaining your pack is to collect one for free from the Information desk at Ronaldsway airport. Its directly ahead of you as you enter the building through the main doors.
